Bradford 2025 and Creative Lives have announced the recipients of 'Do Your Thing' micro-awards which support community-driven creative projects across the district to celebrate the everyday creativity of Bradford's residents.

As part of the UK City of Culture programme over 50 grassroots creative groups have been selected under the UK City of Culture programme, and will receive a share of just over £20,000 to open-up opportunities for cultural participation in a multitude of ways.

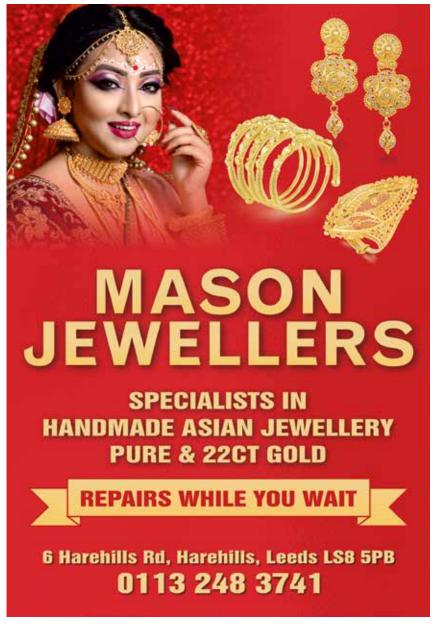

A new free exhibition features rarely seen items from the Arabic and Urdu collections of the British Library, as well as exploring the connections between boxing and calligraphy, through the eyes of a group of British South Asian Muslim men living in Bradford today.

'Fighting to Be Heard', forms part of Bradford 2025 UK City of Culture's (Bradford 2025) opening celebrations, runs from 17th January to 27th April, and features rarely seen items from the Arabic and Urdu collections of the British Library and items from Bradford District Museums and Galleries collection.

Bradford Council's Cartwright Hall Art Gallery will exhibit rare Qurans, some of which have never been displayed in the North of England before, with the oldest dating back to the 9th century, alongside modern artworks inspired by calligraphy and typography

Also on display will be historical and contemporary items from the collection of Bradford District Museums and Galleries, including works by artists Anwar Jalal Shemza, Shahzia Sikander and photographer Peter Sanders among others

'Fighting to Be Heard' is an exhibition co-curated with World Champion boxer Tasif Khan, members of his boxing academy.

Objects in the exhibition have been chosen by Bradford based calligrapher, Razwan Ul-Haq and members of Bradford's Tasif Khan Community Boxing Academy. It includes an Early Quran from Near East or Iraq, dating back to the 9th century CE; one of the finest

examples of II-Khanid manuscript illumination, the 14th century Öljaitü Qur an, which is entirely painted in gold; handwritten Sufi Poetry in the Gujri dialect dating back to 1590 and an artwork from 2012, three paper aeroplanes calligraphed by the late Palestinian artist Dia Batal, which

explores how contemporary calligraphy can be used as a form of protest and self-expression.

'Fighting to Be Heard' features the men's personal stories and their reactions to the collections – offering intimate perspectives on these historical items and a look at the unexpected similarities between boxing and calligraphy and how they can inspire one another.

The showcase features as part of a wider programme of activity forming part of Bradford's work with national partners throughout the year as UK City of Culture. The programme will

celebrate the city and surrounding district, tell the stories of its diverse communities, and spotlight its dynamic contemporary culture.

In 2022, the "Uncovering" programme - supported by Hospice UK, The Leap, Bradford Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, and WomenZone - successfully empowered Pakistani women to form a bereavement support group.

The initiative revealed the systemic barriers these women face and underscored the urgent need for meaningful dialogue, understanding, and action to address inequities.

Rubina Khalid, Chief Executive at WomenZone said: "We had previously delivered a project at WomenZone, funded by HOSPICE UK, to understand how Pakistani communities, particularly women, cope with the death of a loved one.

"This time, we partnered with Bradford Leap and NHS palliative care to bring together diverse organisations across the "death system" in Bradford. The aim was to facilitate direct discussions with women about their experiences and foster network/relationship building." Building on these insights, the new project aims to develop a systemic support model by fostering connections between women and diverse organisations within Bradford's "death system."

Through this initiative, women will have opportunities to share their stories, engage in dialogue, and build networks that can inform more equitable end-of-life care.

"We need to ensure those on the margins have their voices and stories heard and that services meet them where they are at. This project aimed to set this in motion through workshops on topics that mattered to Pakistani women and in partnership with people and services across Bradford there to

Artist Shy Burhan has lead a series of six workshops, using culturally relevant and accessible creative methods to facilitate discussions and empower women to share their experiences. The workshops focused on intersectional challenges, particularly around access to hospice and bereavement services.

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Baton of Hope Calltocityto

A symbolic baton representing mental wellbeing will be carried through Leeds for the first time later this year as part of a special UK-wide tour to inspire hope through action in suicide prevention.

The city has been chosen as one of 20 locations to host the 'Baton of Hope' on its tour in September to October to raise awareness and challenge stigma around suicide.

The baton will stop in Leeds on September 10th – coinciding with World Suicide Prevention Day – and organisers are inviting anyone affected or bereaved by suicide to apply now to be 'baton bearers' on its journey through the city.

The baton was devised by suicide prevention charity Baton of Hope UK, as a parallel icon to the Olympic torch, but one that celebrated mental health rather than physical wellbeing.

One of the original co-founders of Baton of Hope UK is Steve Phillip, whose son Jordan was living in Leeds when he died by suicide on December 4 2019 at the age of 34.

Steve, of Harrogate, went on to set up The Jordan Legacy in his memory, a community interest company (CIC) which campaigns for a zero suicide society.

It was through his campaigning work that he met fellow Baton of Hope UK co-founder Mike McCarthy, who lost his son Ross, 31, to suicide in 2021.

Steve, who has since stepped back from Baton of Hope UK to focus on his work with The Jordan Legacy, said: "Given Jordan's connection with Leeds, it feels particularly poignant that the baton will be coming to the city and I'm very much looking forward to supporting this amazing initiative.

"Together, we can make a real difference when it comes to preventing all preventable suicides in the UK."

The tour itself will see the Baton of Hope – created by Thomas Lyte, official gold and silversmiths to the FA cup – passed between volunteers as part of a relay through the city, visiting different spaces, communities, venues and events.

Leeds City Council is working closely with the charity, and partners across Leeds, in organising the day as a key supporter of the city's leg of the tour.

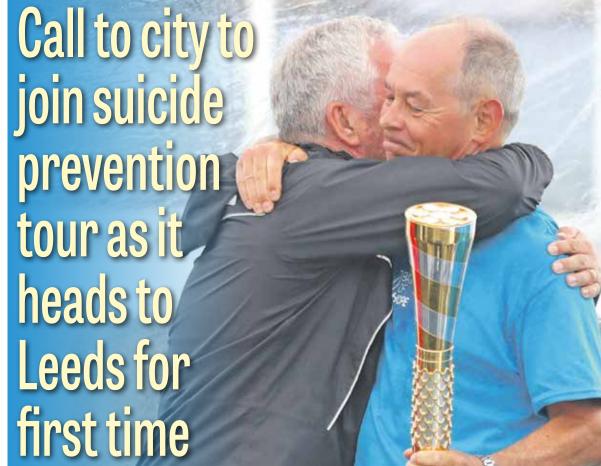
Reducing suicide and the stigma around it is a priority in Leeds, with working to make this a mentally heathy city named as a key objective in the Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2023-2030.

The most recent data by the Office for National Statistics shows the three-year average suicide rate in Leeds for 2021-2023 was 11.6 per 100,000 people - higher than the England average rate of 10.7.

The council also commissions the Leeds Suicide Bereavement Service, for anyone bereaved or affected by suicide.

Councillor Fiona Venner, Leeds City Council's executive member for equality, health and wellbeing, said: "We're honoured to have been chosen to host the Baton of Hope tour and help raise awareness of this important issue.

"Every suicide death leaves behind family, friends, colleagues and

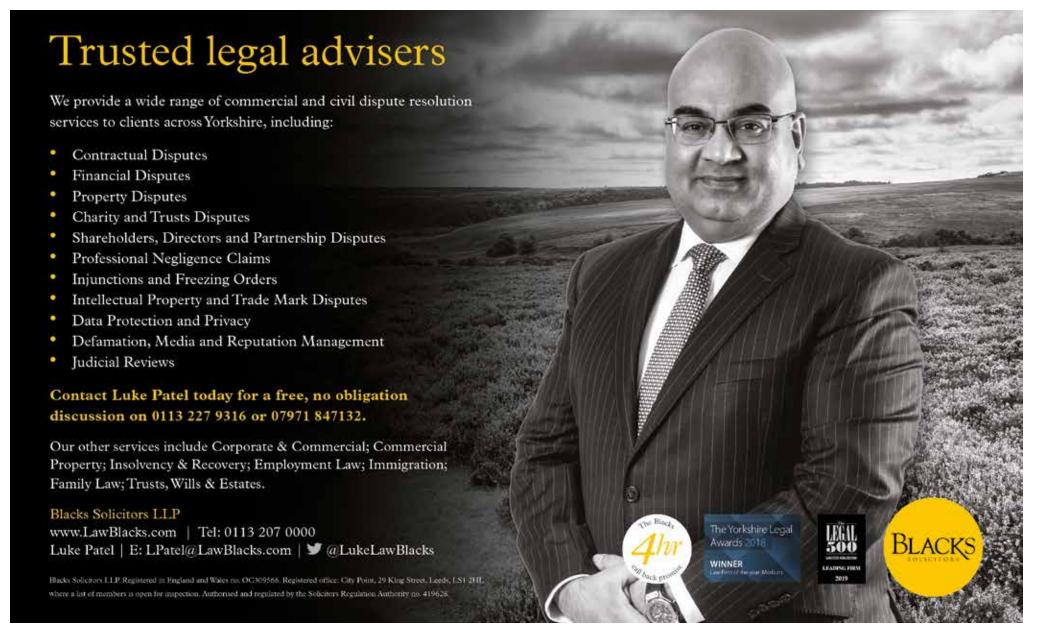
"We have a long-term commitment to suicide prevention in Leeds and this tour is an incredibly moving way to show the strength of feeling in the city to reduce the number of people dying by suicide and remind us that no-one is alone – help is out there for those in need."

Victoria Eaton, Leeds City Council's director of public health, said: "We're

so proud to be hosting this iconic tour in Leeds this year and hope it will be provide an inspirational opportunity for people to come together and show our city-wide commitment to promoting positive mental health and reducing stigma around suicide.

"Having suicide survivors and those bereaved by suicide in Leeds involved in carrying the baton will be a powerful way to honour their own survival or memory of a lost loved one and I would encourage anyone interested to apply now through Baton of Hope UK."

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Natural healing

Student develops biodegradable dressing to help transform wound care

A Master's student from the University of Wolverhampton has developed a ground-breaking biodegradable wound dressing which could help transform wound care.

Student Khabat Jamel has created innovative hydrogels, as part of her research project, combining the natural healing properties of thyme and ginger with the potent antimicrobial action of silver nanoparticles, offering a sustainable and effective alternative for wound care.

Khabat manufactured the hydrogel under the supervision of Dr Abhishek Gupta, Senior Lecturer in the School of Pharmacy at the University and an expert in advanced wound dressings.

As part of the project, Khabat created silver nanoparticles using green chemistry methods and utilised the natural bio reducing properties of thyme and ginger extracts. Thyme, known for its anti-bacterial and antioxidant properties, and ginger, famed for its anti-inflammatory effects, were chosen for their unique contributions to wound

The silver nanoparticles were incorporated into bacterial cellulose hydrogels, resulting in a cutting-edge wound dressing with broad-spectrum antimicrobial activity.

The transparency of the hydrogels allows easy wound monitoring without needing to remove the dressing, making it particularly beneficial for managing chronic wounds, such as those experienced by diabetic patients and individuals with pressure ulcers.

Khabat said: "Our thyme and ginger silver nanoparticle loaded hydrogels offer a next generation solution for wound care. Using natural extracts from thyme and ginger, we've crafted a dressing that not only combats infection but does so in an environmentally sustainable way.

"Chronic wounds are notoriously difficult to treat, especially with rising antibiotic resistance. Our hydrogel, fortified with green synthesised silver nanoparticles, presents a powerful, eco-friendly alternative to conventional treatments.

"What sets our wound dressing apart is the fusion of cutting-edge nanotechnology with the healing properties of thyme and ginger. This dual action dressing not only reduces bacterial growth but also allows for easier wound monitoring."

Dr Gupta said: "Wound healing is a complex sequence of cellular and biochemical processes that, when uninterrupted, results in successful recovery. A major obstacle to wound healing is uncontrolled infections, which can create conditions at the wound site that hinder the body's ability to heal. This issue is further exacerbated by the rise of antibiotic-resistant microbes, limiting treatment options for clinicians. Therefore, exploring alternative natural healing agents is crucial."

Scottish Government funds £125,000 towards life changing work for flood survivors in Kenya

The Scottish Government's Humanitarian Emergency Fund (HEF), and Islamic Relief has helped over 7,000 flood survivors in Garissa County, Kenya to rebuild their lives following devastating floods in 2024.

In spring of 2024, Garissa County - one of the two most impacted counties - was affected by floods that claimed the lives of 267 people, as well as massive property damage, loss of possessions and displacement of over 380,000 people.

With the help of the Scottish Government's Humanitarian Emergency Fund (HEF), Islamic Relief supported survivors with multipurpose cash transfers to help with healthcare, food, school related costs, and farming to help rebuild lives.

During such disasters as floods, it is reported that gender-based violence increases due to the pressures on men as being seen as the household providers. The additional burdens that disasters place upon them can lead to stress which can breed violence, which is often inflicted upon their spouses.

To combat this rise in domestic violence, Islamic Relief has been training up local people as gender champions. So far, with the help of HEF, Islamic Relief has been able to train 200 champions, 122 women and 78 men. They are taught about gender-based issues, like domestic violence, and their causes. Men are included in this process, so they too

can understand the issues affecting women in their community and advocate for them.

The champions were trained on how to communicate and counsel survivors in cases of gender based related incidents as well as increasing people's understanding, support for survivors, and reporting incidences of violence.

Hassan Abdi Abdille, Islamic Relief Kenya's Country Director said: "When we initially started this programme there was some resistance from men in the community. Many thought it was a foreign concept or ideology that was intrusive to their own area. But also, it was men who had committed domestic violence, further explaining their resistance.

"But by bringing them on board during the training and making them a part of it, it helped demonstrate why this initiative was so important and got them on side. This in turn meant the men involved in our training programme would then communicate these messages to the other men in the community. We also brought in religious leaders into the process, as many would refer to their local imams on issues such as these. Gaining the support of imams helped people buyin to our initiative that has backing in the local mosques.

"We would like to express our heartfelt gratitude to the Scottish Government's, Humanitarian Emergency fund for supporting this project and helping to transform the lives of so many, we are deeply thankful."

Nadeem Baqir, Islamic Relief UK's Regional Community Fundraising Manager in Scotland said: "We are extremely grateful for the incredible support of the Scottish Government whose contribution will help so many people to rebuild their lives after the traumas of losing homes, loved ones and means to make a living due to the impact of devastating floods.

"This project will transform so many lives, and once again we see the generosity and kindness of the Scottish Government's Humanitarian emergency fund, which is a lifeline to many struggling around the world. We thank the Scottish Government for this amazing support."



Two hospital teams shortlisted for national healthcare awards

Two specialist hospital teams from Bradford who have been shortlisted for three national healthcare awards considered the 'Oscars' for the sector.

The HSJ Partnership Awards celebrates health professionals where good practice and innovative programmes are celebrated among NHS staff and commercial colleagues.

Bradford Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, which operates the Bradford Royal Infirmary, St Luke's Hospital and the district's community hospitals, has had two teams nominated after impressing the HSJ judges.

The Rheumatology and Transformation team has been shortlisted in two categories for their revamped Rheumatology Nurse Advice Line which was implemented alongside IT partners, Dr Doctor.

The team was shortlisted for the 'Best contribution to improving the efficiency of NHS services' award and 'Most effective contribution to improving care for those with long-term conditions' prize.

Consultant Rheumatologist, Kavitha Nadesalingam, said: "This work which was led by Clinical Nurse Specialist (CNS) Catherine Short and I, along with support from the trust's transformation team, has transformed our rheumatology advice line service.

"It has reduced waiting times by redirecting calls that would have otherwise come through to our CNS team to patient resources, thereby reducing our call back time and helping patients quicker.

The Trust's Responsive Emergency Assessment and Community Team (REACT) service which provides an Acute Palliative Care Virtual Ward with daily Emergency Department in-reach has been shortlisted for the 'Best contribution to the improvement of urgent and emergency care' award.

This work which sees the hospital team working alongside colleagues from Marie Curie Bradford, aims to prevent unnecessary hospital admissions in the last year of life and ensure patients are cared for in the community and in their own homes, which is where they tell the service they want to be treated.

Consultant in Palliative Medicine, Clare Rayment said 'I am delighted the collaboration between Marie Curie and Bradford Teaching Hospitals has been shortlisted for this national award as the best contribution to the improvement of urgent and emergency care.

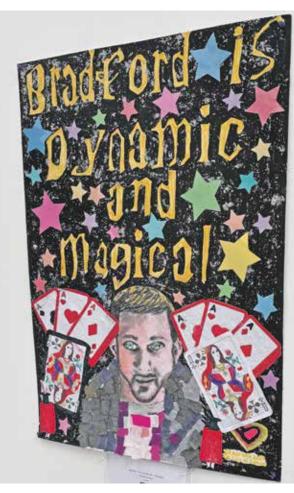

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Three men convicted in Belgium over their involvement in a major people smuggling ring following a joint investigation by the National Crime Agency and Belgian police have been arrested in the UK.

The men – all Afghan nationals – were apprehended by National Crime Agency and Metropolitan Police Service officers in south London, Hertfordshire and Essex after warrants were issued for their arrest by Belgian courts.

Ziarmal Khan (AKA Boxer Bhai), aged 24, was arrested on 6 December by MPS officers at Stansted Airport in relation to a domestic violence offence, and further arrested on behalf of the Belgians while in custody.

Specialist NCA extradition officers then arrested 20-year-old Zeeshan Banghis (AKA Bangash Zeeshan) at an address on New Kent Road on 18 December and Saifur Rahman Ahmedzai (AKA Raees Hamza), 23, at an address in Hemel Hempstead on Monday 30 December.

Prosecutors in Belgium say the trio's gang were involved in organising the transport of migrants from Afghanistan through Iran, Turkey and the Balkans into western Europe, mainly France and Belgium.

Many would eventually be put on small boats from northern France to the UK, with the gang suspected of transporting thousands of people this way.

The group also committed serious sexual offences against male migrant minors, including rape which they would video and use footage to blackmail the victims into criminality and further sexual abuse.

NCA investigators supported the

Belgian investigation for around two years, supplying intelligence and evidence to the Belgian Federal Police around suspected members of the network.

Last month, a court in Antwerp convicted and sentenced the trio and 20 other members of the gang to a

total of 170 years imprisonment, with sentences ranging from two to 18 years.

Eleven members were tried in their absence, including the three men arrested in the UK.

Ahmedzai was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment, while Khan and

Banghis were each sentenced to three years in jail. All three were also fined 3,000 Euros.

They now face being returned to Belgium to serve their sentences and extradition proceedings have commenced.

Officers also worked with

colleagues from Border Force and Immigration Enforcement to identify migrants and victims of the network who had been transported to the UK, conducting safeguarding checks.

NCA Deputy Director Craig Turner said: "This operation shows that no matter where people smuggling gangs operate, we will find them and bring them to justice.

"These men were part of a network involved in illegally moving migrants across the globe, through Europe and eventually into northern Europe and the UK, profiting from the dangerous situations they put vulnerable people into as they were transported, and committing the most heinous sexual offences against them.

"The work done by NCA officers, alongside partners in the UK and Belgium, was crucial to securing the convictions in Antwerp of gang members in November this year, and these further arrests should send a very clear message that we will not stop in our work to disrupt and dismantle the gangs that are behind these horrendous crimes."

Home Secretary Yvette Cooper, said: "This case is nothing short of sickening. These men ran extensive illegal smuggling operations and inflicted extreme cruelty on the migrants they smuggled – some of them children – when they were at their most vulnerable.

"I am grateful to the NCA, Border Force and Immigration Enforcement officers, for their hard work and dedication in pursuing these vile criminal gangs, safeguarding victims of exploitation and protecting our borders."



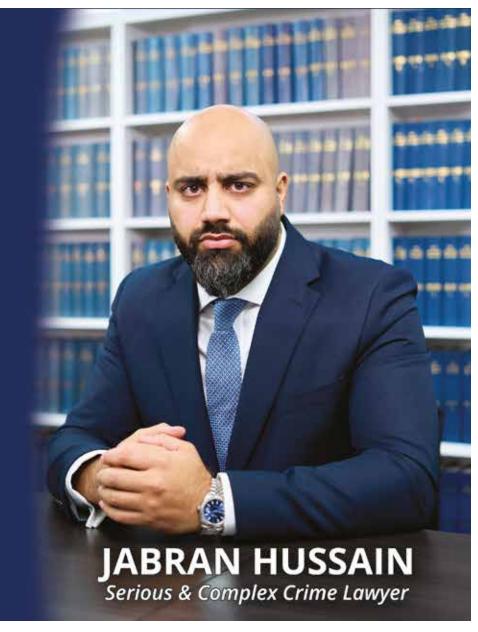

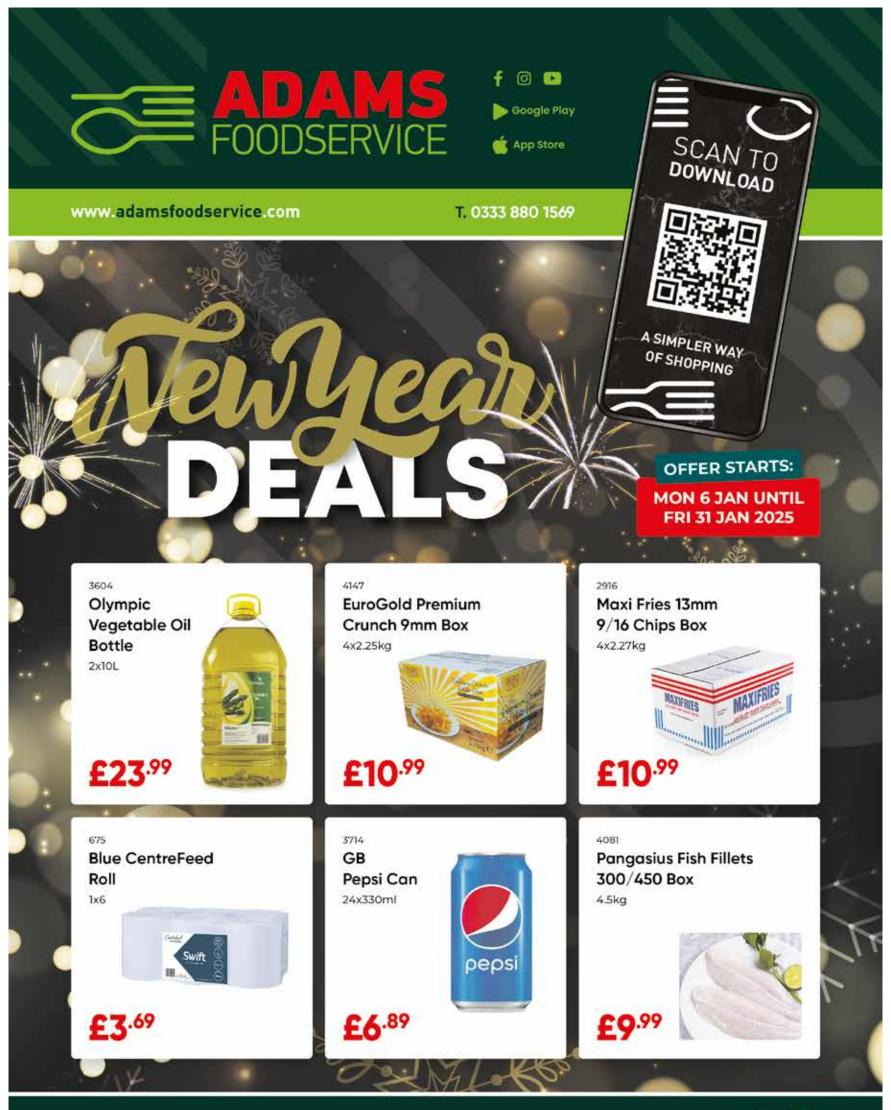

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A recent report by security firm Egress has highlighted the increasing role that quishing is playing in phishing attacks. With the popularity of QR codes rising all the time, cybercriminals have identified them as an 'easy' route into an organisation's data and infrastructure.

Like most phishing attacks, it plays on the trusting nature of an employee, tricking them into using the QR code that looks like it will take them to a legitimate page.

However, it instead pushes the victim towards a malicious site that can result in cybercriminals gaining direct access to a company's systems.

Whilst the increasing use of QR codes has driven cybercriminals to this new tactic, it has also been the successful countering of malicious hyperlinks with intelligent cloud-based solutions that have meant that they have had to find new ways of finding holes in company defences.

As we know, cybercriminals tend to be at least one step ahead of the sectors' attempts to keep them out, and QR codes offer a real opportunity for bad players to go around new, effective defences.

Egress identified that from 1st January – 31st August 2024, 12 percent of all phishing attacks contained a QR code. This is likely to increase substantially in 2025 due to an expected surge in QR code usage this year so companies have to become more aware of what such threats look like and how their employees can better manage the incoming phishing attacks.

The report highlights what a typical attack looks like:

Step 1 - The victim receives a phishing attack containing a QR code, often accompanied by social engineering

techniques designed to compel them to read it. Cybercriminals typically emphasise elements such as urgency, authority, or emotional appeals within the email to increase the likelihood that the recipient will engage with the malicious payload

Step 2 - The victim uses their smartphone camera to read the QR code, which prompts them to open their browser and directs them to a malicious website.

Step 3 - Depending on the nature of the website, the victim could be asked to enter log-in credentials or financial details, or malware may be downloaded onto their device. If the attacker successfully gains access to a user's credentials, they can use these to launch further attacks within an organisation or move laterally across networks

Rob Batters, Director or Managed and Technical Services, Northdoor explains: "Essentially, quishing works the same as a 'normal' phishing attack; however, by utilising a trusted source such as a QR code, cybercriminals are increasing their chances of success. Quishing, as a tactic, is relatively new, but as companies and solutions begin to catch up cybercriminals are already adapting their approaches.

"Some are putting the malicious QR code on a coloured background to try and make it harder for software to identify the code's anchors and highlight it as malicious.

"Others are embedding the code within emails as attachments. Once the attachment is open it can be opened as any other QR code but it can trick some software into allowing it through.

"The most sophisticated approaches involves embedding QR codes within macro-enabled Excel files. When opened these files execute macros that assemble a malicious URL from separate cells and generate a QR code from it. As most solutions struggle to analyse a fragmented URL components it increases the chances of the code getting through. The positive for

"The efforts of cybercriminals to find a soft underbelly of a company's security will "Many are turning to third-party consultancies to help shoulder some of the pressure. The 'Healthy Heart Screening' uses appbased technology, provided by PocDoc, to offer patients a comprehensive cholesterol profile, body mass index score, heart age estimate, and a ten-year risk assessment for having a heart attack or stroke.

The use of the new technology means patients can have the results of their screen within minutes and start making healthy changes straight away.

Patients will also be offered resources to help them understand their results and lifestyle advice on how to improve their heart health.

In West Yorkshire, almost 6% of the adult population has CVD, and over 115,000 people are at high risk of developing a heart attack or stroke over the next 10 years according to their QRISK score.

By detecting risk early, it means patients have the chance to reduce this through a healthy diet and exercise, as well as receiving further preventative care if needed.

Importantly, the Healthy Heart Screening is proven to be successful in reaching those at higher risk of developing CVD, including Black or South Asian people, those with severe mental illness or learning disabilities, people living in deprivation, men aged 40 to 59 and women aged 35 to 55.

The first screenings will be delivered at the following sites: Get Set Goal at the University of Huddersfield, Healthy Heart Community Hubs in Wakefield, and

Community Pharmacy Independent Prescribing Pathfinder pilot sites. Screenings will be offered to those in

Moana 2 causes a copyright headache for Disney

here have been widespread headlines recently that Disney is being sued for \$10 billion USD (approximately £8.1 billion) for alleged copyright infringement in relation its hit animation film Moana 2.

Buck Woodall, an American animator has initiated legal action against Disney in the California Federal Court claiming that Disney has stolen elements of a screenplay he produced for an animated film project in the early 2000s named "Bucky". The screenplay was shared with the Director of Mandeville Films, an independent film company, in 2003 and featured a character who "encountered a tattooed demi-god with a giant hook" and "a giant creature that's concealed within a mountain". The Director also asked Mr Woodall to provide production plans and character designs so they could proceed with the development of the animation.

Mr Woodall claimed that he received copyright protection for these materials in 2004, which was updated in 2014, and he believes that his materials were passed over to Disney through "legal loopholes".

The legal action refers to alleged overlaps with his screenplay and Moana 2. Both involve an ancient Polynesian village and the Polynesian belief in spiritual ancestors manifested as animals as well as a plot involving a "symbolic necklace" and a dangerous adventure to save a Polynesian island.

As a result of this alleged copyright infringement, Mr Woodall is seeking an order in addition to damages to ban further infringement of his copyright. The Court will need to consider whether both works are substantially similar or strikingly similar and whether this amounts to Disney's Moana 2 being an infringement of Mr Woodall's ideas.

Whilst this case relates to a copyright claim in the United States, there are also copyright laws in this country. The Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 protects the author or creator's rights giving them the exclusive right to copy, adapt, lend or sell copies of their work. Copyright protection starts as soon as the work is created and is enforceable until 70 years after the author or creator's death. If those rights are infringed, then the author or creator can pursue legal action with potential remedies including damages and/or an injunction to stop the person making further use of the work.

It appears that Mr Woodall tried to sue Disney previously over the first Moana film that was created in 2016. However, due to limitation under US law, that claim was dismissed. With the release of Moana 2,

legal action is once again being taken by Mr Woodall. This highlights the importance of knowing the limitation periods for claims. In England and Wales, a claim for copyright infringement must be brought within six years from the date of the infringement.

5.4 million yet to file their tax return

With less than a month to go, the countdown is on for 5.4 million customers who still need to complete and pay their Self Assessment and avoid penalties, HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) warns.

Thousands of taxpayers have already done so by completing their tax returns before the fizz was barely flat on New Year's Day. HMRC can today reveal more than 24,800 people filed on 1 January.

A further 38,000 had even squeezed theirs in before the bells on 31 December, with 310 filing between 23:00 and 23:59.

Filing your tax return and paying on time plays an important role in supporting public services and the government's Plan for Change, which is delivering economic stability and investment across the UK. Anyone who is yet to file their tax return can do so online, via GOV.UK.

Anyone required to file a tax return for the 2023 to 2024 tax year who misses the 31 January 2025 deadline could face an initial late filing penalty of £100.

Myrtle Lloyd, HMRC's Director General for Customer Services, said: "We know completing your tax return isn't the most exciting item on your New Year to-do list, but it's important to file and pay on time to avoid penalties or being charged interest.

"The quickest and easiest way to complete your tax return and pay any tax owed is to use HMRC's online services – go to GOV.UK and search 'Self Assessment' to get started now."

Some 97% of customers now file online and one benefit is that they don't have to complete it all in one go – they can save what they have done and pick it up again later.

Once a tax return is filed, payments can also be made quickly and securely through the HMRC app. Customers can set up notifications in the app to remind them when payments are due, so they don't need to worry about missing deadlines or penalties. Information about the different ways to pay, can be found on GOV.UK.

HMRC has a wide range of resources online including a series of video tutorials on YouTube, help and support on GOV.UK, to support customers in completing their tax return.

For people who can't meet

the tax return deadline, HMRC will treat those with reasonable excuses fairly if they tell us before 31 January.

There are also additional penalties for paying late of 5% of the tax unpaid at 30 days, 6 months and 12 months. If tax remains unpaid after the deadline, interest will also be charged on the amount owed, in addition to the penalties above.

If someone regularly sells goods or provides services through an online platform, they may need to pay tax on their income. Customers can find out more about selling online and paying taxes on GOV.UK by searching 'online platform income' or by downloading the HMRC app. The guidance will help them decide if their activity should be treated as a trade and if they need to complete a Self Assessment tax return.

Criminals use emails, phone calls and texts to try to steal information and money from taxpayers. Before sharing personal or financial details, people should search 'HMRC tax scams' on GOV.UK to access a checklist to help decide if the contact received is a scam.

The penalties for late tax returns are:

- an initial £100 fixed penalty, which applies even if there is no tax to pay, or if the tax due is paid on time
- after 3 months, additional daily penalties of £10 per day, up to a maximum of £900
- after 6 months, a further penalty of 5% of the tax due or £300, whichever is greater
- after 12 months, another 5% or £300 charge, whichever is greater

You also may need to file a return if you:

- are newly self-employed and have earned gross income over £1,000
- earned below £1,000 but wish to pay Class 2 National Insurance Contributions voluntarily to protect your entitlement to State Pension and certain benefits
- are a new partner in a business partnership
- have received any untaxed income over £2,500
- receive Child Benefit payments and need to pay the High Income Child Benefit Charge because you or your partner earned more than £50,000

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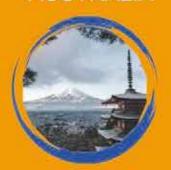

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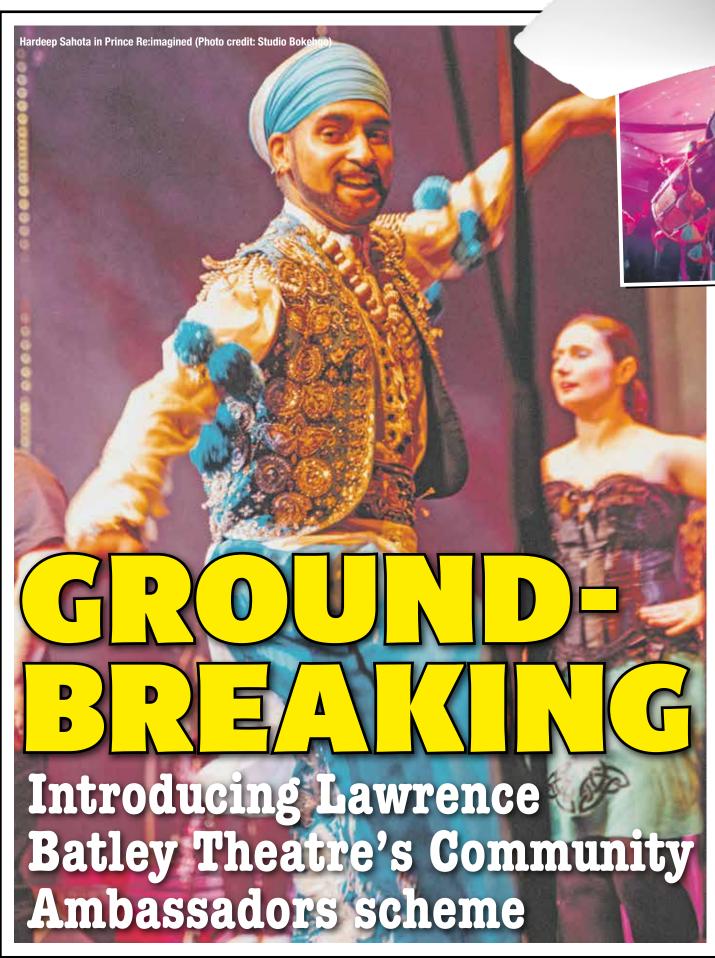

Lawrence Batley Theatre, Huddersfield have been working closely with local South Asian artists to welcome new audiences to experience the magic of the arts.

The West Yorkshire theatre's Community Ambassadors scheme aims to reflect the diversity found in the region, with a particular focus on welcoming South Asian communities to the theatre.

The scheme was launched two years ago, seeing the theatre work closely with local artists and members of the South Asian community in Kirklees to make a step change in the programme of shows and activities at the

theatre and to understand why local people of South Asian heritage were underrepresented in the theatre's audience, staff and programme.

The Community Ambassadors engage with various community groups, ensuring that underrepresented voices are heard and celebrated. They organise workshops, discussions, and performances at the theatre that highlight different cultural perspectives, playing a crucial role in broadening the theatre's reach and impact.

The theatres' Community Ambassadors are local South Asian artists, they include dance artist Hardeep Sahota, producer and food author Sobia Bashir and theatre-maker Madiha Ansari

Since 2023 the scheme has helped kickstart a number of creative projects, these include South Asian women's choir Song Geet, Rasm-e-Milan, a multicultural music and dance showcase held in the theatre's courtyard, Prince Re:imagined, a large-scale Arts Council funded project which reimagined the music of Prince into diverse musical genres, a regular Bhangra Night with Bhangra DJs, Dhol drum players and dancing, alongside a series of Bhangra and Giddah dance classes.

The Community Ambassador scheme now continues to grow. In spring 2025 the theatre presents an Olivier-award nominated drama from South Asian theatre makers on their main stage. 10 Nights, from Phizzical Productions and written by Shahid Iqbal Khan, is the story of one man's journey of self- discovery as he takes part in itikaf, sleeping and fasting in the mosque for the last ten nights of Ramadan.

They also present Rassam, a free exhibition of photography which explores South Asian traditions curated by Hardeep Sahota and captured by local photographer John Slemensek-Thorne. The theatre is also working closely with the Community Ambassadors on the development of a South Asian Arts Cultural Hub, providing space at the theatre for South Asian artists to develop their creative practice.

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Electric car sales to increase to 440,000 in 2025, but still missing UK industry target

Electric car sales in the UK will increase to 440,000 in 2025, representing 24% of 1.84 million total new car sales, according to forecasts from leading EV leasing company DriveElectric.

This is a 4.4% increase compared to electric car sales equating to 19.6% of the total new car market in 2024 (381,970 units) - although new electric car registrations accounted for 31.0% of the market in December 2024 as manufacturers aimed to hit the government's Zero

Emission Vehicle (ZEV) mandate target.

The continued growth in electric car sales shows that more and more motorists are embracing EVs, but the forecast of electric cars representing 24% of total sales this year means that the 2025 ZEV mandate target of 28% will be missed.

DriveElectric's 2025 electric car sales forecast is informed by a number of factors.

Good news includes that there are increasing numbers of new EVs

coming to market in 2025, with smaller and more affordable models, including new entrants from China, as well as battery costs reducing and more EVs being offered at price parity with petrol cars.

The latest EVs have longer driving ranges and faster charging, helping to break down the barrier of range anxiety which has been cited as a blocker to adoption, and amplified by misinformation.

The UK's charging network is continuing to expand, particularly

with more rapid and ultra-rapid chargers, giving consumers added confidence to switch to EVs.

There are still also significant financial incentives for businesses and fleets to transition to EVs, thanks to low benefit in kind (BIK) tax rates (2% until April 2025, then rising by 1% each year to 5% in April 2028). These low BIK rates have fuelled the increasing popularity of salary sacrifice, which can reduce the monthly cost of driving an EV by up to 40% for the employees of an

organisation. Businesses will also be incentivised to electrify to enable them to report on carbon emission reductions, helping to secure existing contracts and win new business.

However although financial incentives exist to support businesses and fleets to transition to EVs, there are currently no similar measures such as grants for private motorists, which will continue to hold back retail EV sales.

DriveElectric's forecast for 1.84 million overall car sales in the UK in 2025 is slightly lower than some other industry figures because it is expected that some manufacturers will reduce sales of petrol and diesel cars in an effort to meet the ZEV mandate targets – a development that was already evident in 2024.

Adam Kemp, Partnerships Director, DriveElectric, comments: "We are forecasting that electric car sales in 2025 will experience an increase of just over 4% compared to 2024 figures, taking them to 24% of the total new car market, which is significant progress,

but this still falls short of the 2025 ZEV mandate target of 28%.

"A key factor in the shortfall is that while businesses and fleets enjoy financial incentives to make the switch to electric cars, and although EVs have lower whole life costs than petrol and diesel cars, there are currently no incentives for private motorists to purchase new EVs."

DriveElectric, one of the UK's leading electric vehicle leasing companies, uses its own model built from its intelligence of the UK market to forecast registrations of battery electric cars and vans each year. In January 2024 DriveElectric accurately predicted that the percentage of EV

sales for 2024 would be closer to 19% of the total market rather than the industry forecast of 22%, the latter being revised downwards later in the year to around 19%.

Although some manufacturers may hit or exceed the 28% ZEV mandate target for 2025 (Tesla, a company that only sells EVs, being one of the obvious winners), many manufacturers are likely to fall short of the target because they currently don't have enough EVs in their model ranges, and demand for EVs from private motorists remains much lower than from businesses and fleets.

There are steep fines of £15,000 for each vehicle within the ZEV $\,$

mandate's 28% allocation that isn't zero emission, but there are ways that car manufacturers can work around a shortfall in EV sales, including by the sale of low emission petrol and diesel cars, which is expected to contribute an additional 3% to the industry's figures in 2024, so achieving the ZEV mandate target for the year. The government is currently consulting on details around the 2030 end of sales date for petrol and diesel cars, as well as flexibilities in the ZEV mandate, a process which is due to be completed on 18 February 2025.

Electric vehicles are seen as a key solution to help the UK achieve its net zero greenhouse gas targets, as well as helping with the problem of local air quality. EVs also have lower running costs than petrol and diesel vehicles, however an overwhelming factor in the rapid increase in EV adoption is that the vast majority of motorists prefer the driving experience of EVs compared to petrol and diesel cars and vans.

DriveElectric is an electric vehicle leasing company that has been helping organisations and individuals to adopt EVs to save money, lower emissions and transition to low carbon energy since 2008. DriveElectric aims to make the switch to electric cars and vans simple for business fleets, offering added benefits including monitoring and optimising emissions from charging fleet vehicles.

Audi UK recorded 122,431 vehicle sales in 2024, placing the brand third in the overall market with a market share of 6.3 percent.

Despite challenging market conditions, battery electric vehicle (BEV) sales remained strong, with a total of 24,216 BEVs sold in 2024 - equating to a record share of 20 percent of Audi UK's overall sales. The Audi Q4 e-tron was the second best-selling BEV in the UK with 17,622 examples sold.

Audi's lineup of plug-in hybrid TFSI e models once again performed strongly with 12,399 sales. Combined with the number of BEVs, almost one in three new Audis sold in 2024 had a plug.

José Miguel, Director Audi UK said: "Audi has embarked on its most ambitious new model initiative and appetite for our growing lineup of fully electric e-tron models remains strong.

"Throughout 2025 our model portfolio will continue to be renewed with all-new versions of some of the brand's key models, such as the Audi Q5, while the arrival of the fully electric Audi A6 e-tron family broadens our BEV offering and takes the brand into new segments with class-leading technology."

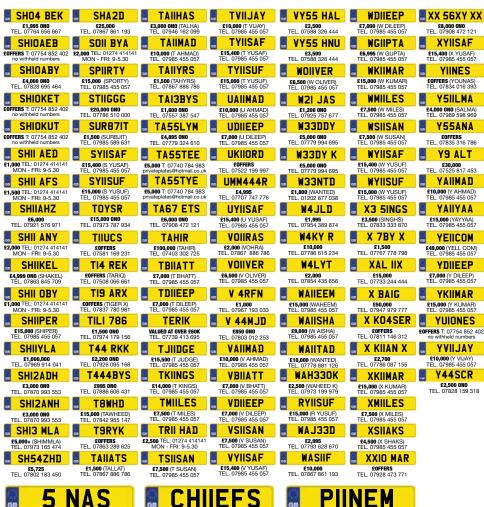

Sport for the 2017 World Paralympic Athletics Championships was charged on Wednesday, 8 January with gross negligence manslaughter and offences under Section 7 of the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 Both UK Athletics and Davies

are due to appear at Westminster Magistrates' Court on Friday, 31 January 2025.

An investigation was launched after emergency services responded to reports of a seriously injured man struck on the head by a metal pole

during a training incident at Newham Leisure Centre in Prince Regent

Lane, E13 on Tuesday, 11 July 2017. The man, Abdullah Hayayei, 36, a United Arab Emirates athlete, was sadly pronounced dead at the scene.

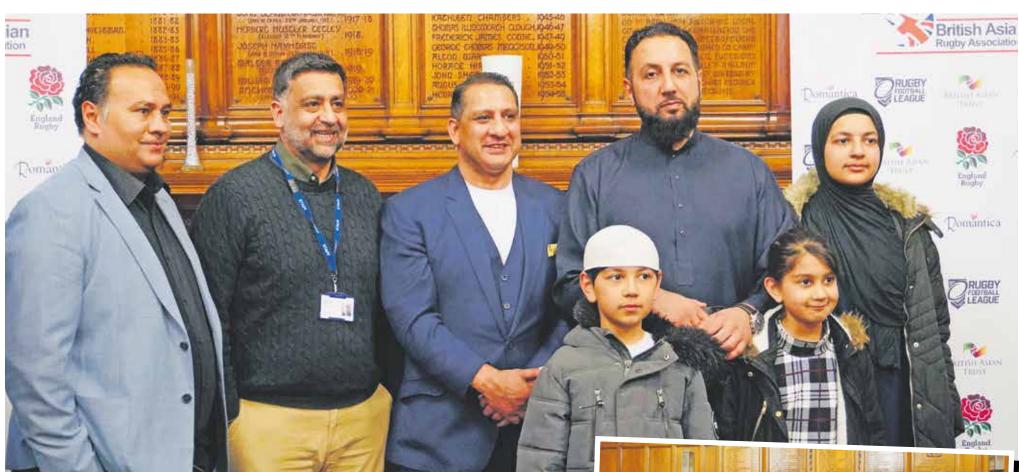
