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32ft 'Fuelling Futures' mural will inspire young people to dream big

Midlands-based street artist Mohammed Ali 'Aerosol' creates 32-foot mural for Yorkshire

If you drive into Manningham Lane, you're in for a BIG surprise!

'Neon Intermission' a 32-foot mural commissioned by Bradford community arts and culture organisation 'The Leap', and created by Birmingham-based street artist Mohammed Ali 'Aerosol', is greeting motorists and pedestrians passing the historic Connaught Rooms building.

The street art depicts a young Muslim woman taking an intermission to read whilst she leans against her car, with a part of Bradford's cityscape reflected in a wing mirror.

The mural, along with several other pieces of public art, is part of The Leap's Fuelling Futures campaign, a partnership with Mission 44, Bradford College and Bradford Council, alongside a wide range of businesses in the motor industry.

The huge dreamscape style artwork, which the artists said was partly inspired stylistically by the Blade Runner films, is thought to be the largest piece of outdoor art in Bradford.

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A major new campaign has been launched by British dads calling on Keir Starmer to increase paternity leave for new fathers and

The campaign is seeking to improve the UK's paternity leave offer, which at just two weeks each paid £184.03 is the worst in Europe.

Campaigners put baby slings on statues across London and Edinburgh, highlighting the role many sportsmen, artists, historical figures and members of the public play as fathers and how this is often forgotten.

This comes as a poll of 4,043 adults found 76% agree that "Fathers these days want to be a bigger part of their children's lives", rising to 90% among dads and 83% among Labour voters.

With Labour committed to a review of parental leave policies in their first year in office, The Dad Shift is inviting members of the public and major national figures to sign their letter to Keir Starmer, calling on him as a fellow father to get behind the

George Gabriel, co-founder of The Dad Shift said, "We're celebrating the role these figures played as fathers as we launch this new campaign for better paternity leave. 90% of dads agree that fathers these days want to be a bigger part of their kids' lives.

"Having seen Keir Starmer stand up for his right to spend time with his children we know he gets it and are sure that a better deal for British dads and co-parents is possible.

Alex Lloyd Hunter, co-founder of The Dad Shift said, "Decent paternity leave is good for fathers, good for mothers and good for babies too. We are calling for paternity leave that is affordable for people to take, gives a substantial allowance of time, and supports equality among parents. It's past time we caught up with the rest of Europe and backed British families.


The UK's current statutory paternity offer ranks 40/43 across the entire OECD in financial terms, but a growing number of employers offer substantially more generous and appropriate leave. These include Aviva, who offer 6 months parental leave to both mums and dads.

Influential Labour MP Josh Simons said, "As the dad of two young kids, I know that parenting in Britain is exhausting and expensive. Hardworking parents have less time and money to give to their local communities and economies than they should and I want that to change. I look forward to the government's review of parental leave and hope it begins to build a fairer approach to paternity leave that strengthens families and unlocks growth."

Marvyn Harrison, co-founder of The Dad Shift and founder of Dope Black Dads said, "One in three British dads take no paternity leave at all and one in two of those who do face financial hardship as a result. We need to set dads and co-parents up for success and there's more and more evidence that doing so will help grow businesses and the economy too.

Thomas Lynch, CEO of Dads Rock Scotland said, "Scottish dads and coparents want to play a full role in the lives of their kids from day one. We need Westminster to play its part and deliver better paternity leave. With the UK's offer the worst in Europe it's well past time.

Jeremy Davies, Deputy CEO of the Fatherhood Institute said, "There's been a



quiet revolution going on for many years in UK families, with fathers doing more hands-on caregiving than ever. But the UK's paternity offer is now the worst in Europe, and dads from all walks of life have had enough. Fathers want more time with their children, and the evidence is clear that children, mothers and the UK economy – not to mention dads themselves – would benefit as a result."



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Mr Ali spent a year creating it in his Birmingham studio in several different pieces, which have now been installed with the help of a crane.

For the artist himself, it's all about empowering and inspiring young people to dream big. He said: "My desire was to paint some messages that are about uplifting young people and the next generation, and trying to equip them with skills and the ability to alter their futures, their trajectory".

He added: "A lot of my work is around social justice and values that are about trying to uplift communities and bring people together. So the concept inspired me - using the arts on this big, bold scale on a giant building which you can't miss and you can see from afar.

"I've got a long history in Bradford, I love the city.

"For me, this is like my gift to plant into the Bradford landscape as a big bold mural that speaks to the everyday people in a very accessible way.

"For me, taking art to everyday people is really one of my missions, and the organisations I'm aligned with, I think we're totally on that same page.

"There's no better medium really of taking art into the everyday more than street art. It is such an amazing way of letting art spill out onto the streets and reach people that it wouldn't reach in a fancy gallery."

Mr Ali also hopes the mural will fuel further interest in people creating street art, and help it play a part in Bradford's upcoming year as UK City of Culture.

"Taking art into the streets like this at this important time, where the nation will be seeing what's coming out of Bradford, I think it's really timely and important to have," he said.

Mr Ali was invited by Bradford community arts organisation The Leap to paint the mural as part of its Fuelling Futures campaign in partnership with Mission 44, which is Sir Lewis Hamilton's charity. Its aim is to harness Bradford's well known car culture to raise

this can really make a difference and that's what we're about.

"This is now going to be one of three new cultural landmarks from The Leap.

"We've done the Living Wall on Leeds Road, we are also working towards an eco-park, and this.

"When people give directions, people are going to be referring to this as a landmark like 'take a left at the mural'. We've been very lucky to work with some amazing partners including Mohammed Ali."

The mural took a team of three people three days to install in its component parts, which included 16 separate wooden panels built together.

The artwork was already causing a stir just minutes after the completion of the installation.

Drivers and pedestrians stopped to admire it and take photos.

Also popping along to see it unveiled was visual artist and spoken work poet Asma Elbadawi, who is also a basketball player known for successfully campaigning to get a ban on hijabs for women partaking in the sport lifted.

She said she hoped the powerful image of a girl in a headscarf would inspire other girls and young people to follow their dreams.

"I think it's amazing. I'm dyslexic, I have my own way of communicating, mostly through art.
"Something like this

"Something like this, that has such a strong message that can be seen by people driving by and walking by, is pretty amazing.


"Having messages likes this like across different areas in Bradford, but especially here on such a busy road, is really good for people to see.

Twelve men convicted of £2.4m Covid grant fraud

Twelve members of a national 'organised crime group' have been convicted of fraudulently claiming in excess of £2.5 million worth of Covid-19 support grants. It follows an investigation by Birmingham City

The group, from Birmingham, Walsall and Yorkshire, used non-trading businesses and stolen identities to cash in on support packages set up during the Covid crisis, making hundreds of fraudulent claims for Covid grant, Bounce $Back\ Loans\ and\ HMRC\ support\ payments.$

Following a long-running investigation by the council's Trading Standards service, they appeared before Birmingham Crown Court over two trials - split because of the number of defendants - each of the 12 either entered guilty pleas or were convicted after trial of offences including conspiracy to defraud and money laundering.

The court heard that there were a number of support packages set up during the pandemic, including Small Business Grants, Bounce Back loans and the Eat Out to Help Out scheme. They were all designed to offer financial support to businesses and individuals who were struggling during the Covid-19 crisis that began in 2020. Fraudulent HMRC Self-Assessment and VAT claims were also submitted.

The court heard that the group saw an opportunity to take advantage of the schemes and became directors of companies that were not trading or used stolen identities to make fraudulent applications for cash. They opened multiple bank accounts and also persuaded other people to use theirs in exchange for payment before the money was laundered through multiple accounts before being transferred out of the UK jurisdiction via accounts in the Netherlands and the United Arab Emirates.

Harun Shehzad and Usaamah Bin Taariq pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud and money laundering before

During the course of their trial, Qirat Deeas, Sameer Ali Mohammed, Tasadaag Hussain, Imann Hussain, Sajid Hussain, Usaamah Bin Tarriq, Noah Deen, Naqeeb Shakurt and Zishan Ahmed pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud and money laundering offences

Ummer Yousaf was convicted after trial. Al-Harris Hussain was convicted after trial for conspiracy to launder the proceeds of crime.

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Cancer survivor who retook GCSEs while recovering tells young people to persevere



'Don't give up on your dream' - that's the inspirational message from cancer survivor Kamaria Mohamed who went back to the classroom to retake her GCSEs while healing from the side effects of her medical treatment.

As thousands of young people received their GCSE results, Kamaria says, don't give up on your dream career, even if you don't get the results you need first time.

Kamaria, now aged 29, didn't get the grades she needed when she was 16, but was determined to retake her GCSEs at some point.

She retook her English and Maths GCSE to meet the entry requirements for a degree course in Psychology and Counselling.

Then, at the age of just 25, the Ward End, Birmingham resident

was diagnosed with aggressive breast cancer and started an intense course of treatment that involved chemotherapy, an operation and radio therapy. Despite this, she decided to go back to studying and this time achieved the grades she needed.

It was the support that Kamaria received from counsellors during her treatment that inspired her to pursue a career in which she could help others going through difficult times.

After gaining her Maths and English GCSE, Kamaria went on to complete the Access to Higher Education Diploma in Social Sciences and Health, achieving distinctions in all of her assignments and impressing her tutors with her resilience and enthusiasm.

Kamaria, who starts a Psychology and Counselling degree in September, said: "I always knew that I wanted to be in a job where I could help people from all walks of life. Going through cancer treatment made me even more determined to achieve my goal.

"When I came across the pre-access course, although I was nervous, the tutor talked me through the process which put my mind at ease and gave me the confidence to pursue this route.

"My advice to young people still unsure of what they want to do in life is to keep a positive mindset and find something you have a passion for. You may not have the grades you need but you can retake and look into other routes you can pursue to get to where you want to be.

"Whatever happens, don't give up on your dream."

"Her experience is proof that with perseverance and the right support you can achieve your dreams.


He simplifies complicated language and reveals the heart and soul of a growing faith tradition that claims more than two billion adherents.

Although devastating, this event marked her initial exposure to space exploration, prompting her to contemplate the possibility of humans venturing into space for scientific research.

successfully Today. having completed her PhD in Astrobiology from The Open University, she now has a successful career in planetary science and is a member of Mars 2020 Perseverance rover's SHERLOC science and operations team.

the Columbia shuttle mishap was the initial spark, Anushree's curiosity about the field of space research deepened while studying for the civil service exams. It was during this time that she first encountered the term "space biology" and the idea of merging space and biology fascinated her greatly. "Despite continuing to prepare for the civil service, the idea of space exploration kept lingering in my mind", she said.

dedicating She began towards researching more about Space Biology and discovered that there were no such programmes in India and moving abroad would be imminent. This realisation set off a whirlwind in Anushree's mind, as she found herself caught between her family's dream of her working in the civil service and her growing fascination in a newly growing field, Astrobiology.

Coming from a small town of Basti in the northern part of India, pursuing a field that no one around her knew much about was a daunting prospect. 'As an Arts student with no scientific background, pursuing Astrobiology seemed beyond my reach. I had a clear vision of what I wanted but no idea how to achieve it, and I had no guidance or resources. We didn't even have a computer at home, so I spent hours at cyber cafes searching online for different opportunities. Seeing my passion and determination, my father eventually got a computer for our home, which greatly aided my efforts and things began to fall into place.

"The journey wasn't easy, but I didn't feel the difficulties at the time because I was driven by passion and a kind of madness. When you're that immersed, you don't feel the challenges, even though they are enormous.'

Anushree's parents were also uncertain about her decision because they had no familiarity with what she was talking about. The concept

of Astrobiology was entirely beyond their understanding and experience, as no one in the family had pursued science, let alone considered space exploration. Anushree's choice of Astrobiology came as a complete surprise to them.

However, she eventually chose to follow her dream and her parents, who still found it all daunting, stood by her decision.

In 2016, while completing her Master of Science in Biotechnology, Anushree met her future PhD supervisor, Professor Karen Professor Olsson-Francis, the Director of AstrobiologyOU and this encounter proved fortuitous as it led to an invitation to apply for a fully funded PhD position at The Open University.

Choosing to pursue a PhD was a tough decision, especially since she was also offered a significant position at NASA Goddard Space Flight Center with Mars Curiosity team, working with Dr Paul Mahaffy. Despite the allure of a prestigious opportunity, she opted for the PhD as it would add depth to her career, and she was even more sure of her decision to choose The Open "The experience was great. It felt like home because I spent about four years doing research and interacting with a fantastic community



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Dr Gemma Clarke, Senior Research Fellow in the University of Leeds' Academic Unit of Palliative Care, said: "Our study provides a unique view on the experiences of British Muslims during the pandemic. It shows the hidden work, challenges and emotional stress taken on by carers during this time

"The findings highlight how crucial it is that people from minority backgrounds are consulted when healthcare policies are designed to avoid marginalising populations especially during vulnerable times in their lives.

"We hope that our findings will help shape future delivery of culturally aware and inclusive healthcare.

The research project was a collaboration between the University of Leeds, University College London´ (UCL), Marie Curie and the Muslim Council of Britain. It was funded by Marie Curie and was led by Dr Briony Hudson from UCL.



People from diverse backgrounds must be included in the development of healthcare policies to ensure all groups' needs are met, new research into palliative care for the Muslim community has found.

The study investigated the experience of British Muslim people and their families who were accessing palliative care services during the COVID-19 pandemic.

It found that language barriers, problems using or accessing smartphones, and uncertainty about how to access information led to a sense of exclusion from COVID-19-related policies and messaging for this population.

An apparent lack of consideration of important festivals in the Muslim calendar in the implementation of policies around lockdowns only exacerbated this problem.

The researchers say that this highlights the need for people from minoritised ethnic groups to be involved in the design and delivery of health and care policies and messaging, to ensure that people from all backgrounds can access health care services, understand how to get the help they need, and advocate for their own and their family members' needs, no matter what their background.

To investigate the experiences of British Muslims accessing palliative care during the pandemic, the study team recruited three peer researchers from Pakistani Asian ethnic groups who spoke multiple languages including Urdu, Punjabi, French and English.

They were all part of the Muslim Council of Britain Research and Documentation Committee. They

conducted 11 telephone interviews between August and September 2021, with five British Muslims with palliative care needs and seven family carers.

The interviews revealed that the pandemic had exacerbated existing challenges to accessing health care services for British Muslims with palliative care needs.

Family members reported experiencing the cumulative impact of supporting people with palliative needs whilst also advocating for and supporting them to access the care they required.

The research team made several recommendations to address inequities in palliative care access, including:

- Research, services and policy should be developed in partnership with people experiencing inequity
- Healthcare providers and organisations must endeavour to understand their local context and population and consider this in the development, delivery and communication about their services.

Zara Mohammed, Secretary General of the Muslim Council of Britain, said: "As the elderly population continues to grow, British Muslims face significant challenges due to the increasing need for comprehensive palliative care - an issue made even more urgent by the devastating effects of the pandemic.

"The disproportionate impact of this issue must be addressed.

"I commend this important body of research for shedding light on the issue and offering the relevant recommendations to guide the way



Co-author Dr Nuriye Kupeli, Principal Research Fellow in the UCL Division of Psychiatry's Marie Curie Palliative Care Research Department, said: "Our work highlights that while families and those closest to people living with life limiting illness took on additional caring responsibilities, they faced many challenges in accessing healthcare. "By exploring and understanding the needs of people from minority backgrounds, including British Muslims, we can work in partnership to build trust, inform future service

and policy development and reduce exclusion.



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

Charity Islamic Relief UK is working with BIMA to continue installing lifesaving defibrillators at mosques across the country to help protect people in emergency situations. During the first phase of this campaign, 63 mosques have already received defibrillators.

Heart disease is a serious problem in the UK, according to the BHF someone is submitted to hospital due to heart attack every five minutes. Unfortunately, with outof-hospital heart attacks, less than one in ten survive, which is why a publicly accessible defibrillator can save lives.

The rate of cardiovascular disease can be higher amongst different demographics, and unfortunately British Muslims do suffer from an increased chance of heart disease and diabetes. This is due to diet, lack of exercise and other factors. The work that BIMA is doing that Islamic Relief UK supports hopes to help this specific need amongst the community, by installing defibrillators in local mosques as they serve as community hubs amongst British Muslims



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

GP advises as she recalls her rare cancer journey with a 4kg tumour

In a startling reminder that cancer can strike anyone, London GP Kripa Shortt found herself on the other side of the stethoscope when a 4kg tumour - equivalent to a small bowling ball - was discovered in her abdomen.

In January 2022, Kripa noticed that her tummy seemed to be getting bigger. At first, she thought this was due to the aftereffects of her pregnancies and that she was getting older.

However, over the next few months, her belly continued growing bigger and bigger despite living a healthy lifestyle and exercising regularly. She noticed that she could see a strange bulge in her belly when doing sit-ups.

Towards the end of 2022, she noticed that her belly size was increasing at a much faster rate. Concerned that her body had changed so quickly, she went to get checked out.

In January last year, about a year after she had first noticed her belly getting bigger, a CT scan revealed that Kripa had retroperitoneal liposarcoma.

Retroperitoneal sarcoma cancers develop deep within the abdomen and pelvis, often with very subtle or ambiguous early symptoms. Kripa said there were no symptoms such as weight loss, change in bowel motions or vomiting.

Within less than a week of diagnosis, Kripa underwent surgery. The tumour measured 20 x 16 cm when removed and weighed 4kg. Kripa also had a hemicolectomy, which is the removal of part of her large intestine.

"As a GP, I recognise the importance of living a healthy lifestyle. I have always exercised regularly with running, weight training and yoga and eating a healthy diet," Kripa recounts.

"Yet, I found myself battling sarcoma. Sarcoma can happen to anybody, but regardless of this, we should try our best to maintain a healthy lifestyle. I'm grateful I sought medical advice when I recognised that something was different in my body.

"I advise everyone to trust their instincts and seek medical advice when they have concerns about a lump, new symptoms or changes in their body. I am very lucky to have been diagnosed early, and my treatment enabled me to overcome the cancer. I advise everyone to be aware of their own body, and when something seems worrying, please see

their GP to get checked."

Kripa is now cancer-free but must go for six-monthly checks to ensure the cancer hasn't returned.

Inspired by her ordeal and eager to raise awareness of sarcoma, her husband, Ollie Shortt, ran the London Marathon for Sarcoma UK in April this year dressed as a bone. He won an award from the Guinness Book of World Records as the fastest person to run a marathon dressed as a human body part.

Richard Davidson, Chief Executive of Sarcoma UK, said: "Kripa's experience is a powerful reminder of how crucial early diagnosis is in the fight against sarcoma. As a rare and often misunderstood cancer, sarcoma can be challenging to detect.

"Kripa's journey underscores the importance of listening to our bodies and seeking medical attention when something doesn't feel right. Remember, if you notice any persistent changes in your body, don't hesitate to consult your GP. Early detection can make all the difference in the world of sarcoma."



His debut album, 2022's Anomaly, was recorded with the legendary Nitin Sawhney and released by Peter Gabriel's Real World Records. It took the sitar into new territory, powered by Jasdeep's remarkable skill and lifelong immersion in the Indian classical tradition.

Later that year, as composer and co-music director on Opera North and South Asian Arts-uk's staging of Monteverdi's opera Orpheus, his mesmerising tapestry of Indian and European music thrilled audiences and critics alike, and was recognised with a haul of awards from across the worlds of music and the stage

With this year's RPS laurels – for 'showing us all the beauty and boundless possibilities of the sitar' - it looks as though Jasdeep has achieved escape velocity from the confines of genre, or the 'World Music

"We're finally shifting the paradigm", he says, anticipating forthcoming dates including Hartlepool Folk Festival and Oxford Festival of Song - more appropriate than it might seem, as his particular school of sitar virtuosity aspires to imitate the human voice with all its nuance and emotion.

"It feels like British Asian musicians are being taken more seriously in the room: at last our music is being programmed alongside western classical repertoire, rather than hived off as something niche or novel."

Apart from two dates with the Liverpool Philharmonic where he'll be performing his astonishing sitar concerto, Arya, on this tour Jasdeep will return to his first love: the high-risk, entirely improvised Indian classical tradition, with his sitar accompanied only by the tabla, the Indian

So what can newcomers to the form expect? "It has all of the discipline and technical demands of western classical music", he says, "but you won't hear much harmony: our musical system is based on the rules of raag and taal, which are melody and rhythm. So you have to shift your focus to the complex development and embellishment of that. And it's all unfolding in the moment, often at speed – that's definitely something that's exciting to experience, and maybe akin to jazz.

The tour concludes with a concert for the Darbar Festival at London's Barbican, a rite of passage for any Indian musician. "It's a been a dream of mine since I was a child", Jasdeep says. "I've seen all my greatest idols at Darbar: Kaushiki Chakraborty, Purbayan Chatterjee, Shahid Parvez... I'm still pinching myself and I really want to do a good job.

"Maybe I need another 10 years to prepare for it", he laughs. "But really I think it's a perfect time, following on from what I've been doing over the last few years, to return to the source and consolidate myself in the Indian classical tradition."
